

2.2. Key Policy Concerns - Represented and under consideration

1	Transfer of Property & Assets by SEZ Units after the cancellation of their LoA.	Submission: Request to adopt a simple buy/sell the SEZ property with a transfer fee option and the other forex obligation could be like the EPCG scheme – 5 years of fob value of machinery to exported for de bonding. SEZ Rules may accordingly be amended to provide much needed relief to the gems and jewellery sector pertaining to Special Economic Zones of India to improve the working of gems & jewellery units in SEZ. Many assets like computers/electronic gadgets/telephone etc. outlived their utility, a conducive policy is needed for their disposal. Issues represented & Update: The said issue is represented to Hon'ble CIM and Hon'ble Finance Minister, Commerce Secretary, Additional Secretary(SEZ), Joint Secretary, DoC, Director General, DGEP and JS, DPIIT. The matter is under consideration of SEZ Division.
2.	Reverse Job Work Policy	Submission Bringing goods from DTA and removal of manufactured goods to DTA is permitted in the SEZ Rules. For removal, duty as applicable u/s 30 of Customs Act is payable as per Rule 47(1) of SEZ Rules. So there is no requirement of specific provision in SEZ Rules. However, to have more clarity, the necessary provision for doing jobwork for DTA may be incorporated in a new rule after Rule 43 as Rule 43A. Issue represented & update: The said issue is represented to Hon'ble CIM, Commerce Secretary, Additional Secretary (SEZ), Joint Secretary, DoC.

Key Highlights of the 2nd Interactive meet

Key Highlights of the 2nd Interactive meet

- 1. Mr. Suvankar Sen, Convener of the SEZ committee, welcomed all the members in 2nd SEZ interactive meet.
- 2. Mr. K K Duggal, Director, Policy shared key GJEPC representations pertaining to various SEZ issues and related updates including the issues which have been resolved and those which are still to be resolved and in the process of being resolved.
- 3. Mr. Rajeev Pandya, President, SGJMA and also Council member, pointed out that several other issues relating to ease of doing business persist in the SEZs to which Mr. K K Duggal updated that all the stated issues have already been represented by the Council and under consideration of the concerned authority. He also mentioned that if there are any issues which he feels to be taken up with Govt. he can write to the Council for due pursuance with the authorities
- 4. Mr Nitin Khandelwal, Deputy Director, Jaipur Region explained the members on the various measures undertaken by the Council in relation to easing off the B2C e-commerce policy and recent update on the same.
- 5. The Convener apprised the members that there have been over 100+ representations with RBI, MOC, MoF, MSMEs, SEZ, RBI, etc and approximately 9- meetings with the Government of India. He also informed the members that the Council is currently working on various key projects for development of exports from districts like cluster mapping project, CFC, Mega CFC, Jewellery Park and CFC and social welfare projects of the workers belonging to it's members like Swasthya Ratna Project, (a subsidised health insurance scheme for workers of members of GJEPC run by GJEPC exclusively for its members) which has proved to be immensely popular and beneficial to members.

6.The Convener updated the members on the various innovative initiatives launched during Covid-19 which included 6 virtual buyer seller meets, 3 virtual trade shows (IIJS) and 5 India Global Connect meets to tap unexplored markets and countries. CAD rendering course, light jewellery making course, Hand setting training program, metal setting training program, Integrated sampling with casting jewellery and a special course in basic modelling for specially abled people were the various training and skill development programs for members, especially those who are from SEZs, that have been already held or are in planning stage. Convener also mentioned of the Webinar on labour laws and an exclusive brochure which is being published by the Council for the benefit of its SEZ members.

Key points to carry forward

- 1. Follow up on the representations to the Govt. made by the Council.
- 2. Requesting the concerned department to look for appointing a full time DC in SEEPZ to solve the local issues and matters more efficiently without being referred to the ministry.
- 3. The concern on the surcharge on electricity in proposed SEZ policy to be undertaken by the GJEPC
- 4. Examining the case of providing Swasthya Ratna Policy to job workers engaged in the SEZ area.
